How long have you been a Friend of Vellore?

It's so long it is hard to remember but I joined when I was at university. It would have been in the early 1950's.

How did you become a Friend?

I was invited to talks at SCM at Melbourne University and someone spoke about Friends of Vellore. When I came to Brisbane after returning from Indonesia and I heard more about Vellore and met Brian Lee through a SCM group.



What was your role as a Friend?

I started helping with a stall. It was a small stall in front of a bank in Paddington. I have played a big role in supplying goods for sale on the stalls, transporting stuff around.

What has been your most rewarding experience as a Friend?

Visiting Vellore CMC was a highlight for me. We got to see the facilities and meet the workers. We talked to some women in a development program doing welding work and they explained they couldn't wear sarees and had to wear overalls for safety. I was very interested in visiting the leprosy centre because of my interest in mycobacteria. We met a woman with leprosy who asked us to pray for her which we did. Everything was beautiful and well done!

VELLORF TODAY

The Christian Medical College and its associated Hospitals are managed and staffed by Indian personnel. Central to both the main Hospital and the College are the Chapels, the spiritual heart of the institution, where Christian services in many Indian languages are held andwhere people of all faiths come to pray. Patients of all religious faiths, or of none, are welcomed for treatment and all are met with the same skill and compassionate care.

The core strength of CMC&H is its staff of over 5000 doctors, nurses, allied health professionals, community health workers and maintenance workers. Highly qualified staff work as clinicians, treating the thousands who come each day for help. They are also teachers, providing both instruction and examples of service to the young men and women who will follow in their steps.



Dedicated to the Christian spirit of service, especially to the disadvantaged, Vellore staff work with people in villages in the surrounding rural areas, promoting health care and assisting economic advancement. Here all students, as part of their training, gain skills in providing health care in a rural environment.

Vaccinate Vellore! Campaign

"Reach the Unreached" – Enabling communities to remain safe during the COVID-19 Pandemic

Phase 1 Roll out

Vaccination for COVID-19 began in CMC on the 20th January 2021, free of cost from the Government for health care workers.

Phase 2 Roll out

In Phase 2, the Government made the vaccine available on a subsidised basis for the vulnerable population of 60 years and above and those above 45 years with co-morbidities. In all, more than 25000 doses of Covishield™ (the Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccine, manufactured in India by M / s Serum Institute of India - SII) and Covaxin™ (Indigenously developed vaccine manufactured by M/s Bharath Biotech Pvt Ltd, in India) were given with no major adverse events recorded from January to April 2021. Once the process for direct purchase was notified, vaccines were purchased from M/s Serum Institute of India.



Phase 3 Roll out:

As a commitment to the local community around us, CMC set apart some of the initial supply to provide vaccines to rural and vulnerable populations, targeting those who have difficulty in accessing urban centres. Vaccines were provided free of cost through the four departments that work in the community. In most areas, the Departments worked with community volunteers associated with healthcare in their respective areas. Through education programs, they were motivated to take the

vaccine and subsequently these volunteers helped to create awareness in their respective villages and enable roll out of the vaccine. All the vaccination centres had teams with nursing, medical and social workers who were trained by the Emergency Department for resuscitation. Each centre was provided with cold chain equipment, ancillary medical equipment such as monitors and defibrillators, to manage any untoward reaction in recipients. An ambulance was stationed exclusively for facilitation of patient movement in an emergency.

RUHSA started the community roll out on 14th June 2021, followed shortly by CHAD, LCECU and CONCH on 23rd June, 2021. While RUHSA has been working in the villages around KV Kuppam, CHAD has begun to offer the service in the areas surrounding CHAD hospital (semi-urban and rural) as well as in their villages. CONCH has been providing vaccination to the labourers at CMC's new campus development site at Kannigapuram, as well as the surrounding villages and LCECU has been targeting the urban poor in their service area within the city.
